Program Notes

In 1937, Carl Orff's Carmina Burana burst onto the stage of the Frankfurt Opera as an edgy, modern masterpiece built on antique texts. Discovered in a Bavarian monastery, these poems are from a collection attributed to the goliards, students and clerics who wandered Europe during the Middle Ages, working as scholars and playing like frat boys.

Notorious troublemakers, the goliards wrote songs and poems celebrating their favorite pastimes – drinking, gambling, womanizing, and making fun of authority figures.

Unfortunately for the goliards, their antics eventually caught up with them. In 1227, they were banned from chanting. In 1229, their dispute with a tavern owner over a bar tab led to riots and legal controversy at the University of Paris. By 1300, they were barred from preaching.

Luckily for us, the monasteries of Europe served as scriptoria, centers devoted to copying manuscripts. While the focus was on religious works, many of the monks were younger sons of aristocracy whose path in life had come down to two options: the military or the church. For those who loved literature, the career choice would have been easy, as would have been the decision to preserve works that were not on the official list. Not only did they squirrel away the Carmina Burana, but we also have monks to thank for preserving ancient works such as Vergil's Aeneid, the poems of Catullus, and Ovid's Art of Love, which was so scandalous that it got him exiled.

From the Carmina, Orff chose poems that painted a picture of restlessness, rowdiness, and joy in three sections: Springtime, In the Tavern, and The Court of Love.

The overarching theme is fortune, a monstrous lottery that controls your life.

The poet warns you to look out for the Roman goddess, Fortuna. If you stay ahead of her, you can grab her by the hair. But if you're late, you can't catch her, because she is bald from behind.

Fortuna holds a wheel. At the top sits a king who thinks he's safe, but the wheel could turn at any time. At the bottom is Hecuba, the queen of Troy who became a slave. She was the victim of poor decisions made by her son, Paris, whose love for Helen led to the Trojan War. Watch for other mentions of Paris and Helen – they are perfect foils for Orff's themes of love and helplessness.

In Springtime, everything is melting, and the sun god, Phoebus Apollo, lies in the lap of Flora, goddess of Spring. In the subsection, On the Green, a girl buys makeup in the hope of catching a new man, and the poet dreams about sleeping with the Queen of England.

In the Tavern focuses on drinking and gambling. Highlights are a song about roasting a swan, as told by the swan, and I am the Abbot of the tavern – the gambler who always wins.

In the Court of Love, a man and woman ponder love, and the chorus turns conjugation into seduction through nonsensical wordplay. The choruses and soloists join in a boisterous celebration that climaxes in the high D of Dulcissime, Sweetest One. And in Hail, Most Beautiful One, the poet takes lyrics usually reserved for the Virgin Mary to celebrate Venus, Blanchefleur, and Helen of Troy.

Pro Arte Chorale, an all-volunteer chorus now celebrating its 60th season, is one of the Northeast's most prominent choral organizations! The Chorale has appeared in major concert venues across the region including the New Jersey Performing Arts Center, Avery Fisher Hall, Alice Tully Hall, Carnegie Hall, and the South Orange Performing Arts Center. In addition to its own subscription series, the Chorale has appeared with the New Jersey Symphony Orchestra, New York Philharmonic, American Symphony Orchestra, Westfield Symphony Orchestra, and the Mark Morris Dance Company. In May 2008 the Pro Arte Chorale traveled to Liverpool, UK to perform with the Liverpool Welsh Choral at Mossley Hill Church, as part of Liverpool's celebration as Cultural Capital of Europe. In May 2009 the Liverpool Welsh Choral traveled to the U.S. to join the Pro Arte Chorale and Westfield Symphony Orchestra in performances of Verdi's Requiem in Ridgewood and Westfield, NJ.

Bryan Zaros is a young American conductor recognized for his "strong musical imagination" and "deep sense of musicality and communication." Bryan is the Associate Director of Music & Choirmaster at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York City where he leads the

Cathedral Choirs, Orchestra and Brass in liturgical as well as concert performances in the grand space of the world's largest Gothic cathedral. He is also the Music Director of the Pro Arte Chorale, Music Director of Central City Chorus and a frequent guest lecturer at the Manhattan School of Music and at music conferences throughout the USA.
